Freedom of Information Act 2000 Information in Relation to Hospital Admissions for Drug Overdoses

Q1. Broken down by year, since 2020, how many admissions have there been related to drug/suspected drug overdose in hospitals within the Trust.

- Q2. What is the most common suspected drug in relation to these overdoses?
- Q3. For the figures outlined in question 1, how many of these patients were, broken down by year:
 - a) Received medical treatment on a ward
 - b) Required admission to intensive care
 - c) Number of deaths of patients who were admitted for drug overdose
- Q4. What is the average length of time a patient stays in ICU for?

A1-4. Please see Table 1 below:

Please note where numbers in the above table are 1-4, in line with Trust policy, it is given as <5, to reduce any risk of identification of individual patients.

In relation to Q1, regarding admissions to hospitals, this has been reflected in the column titled 'Deaths & Discharges.' Clinical coding is completed against a patient's discharge activity which is why discharges has been used rather than admission.

In relation to Q3a and Q3b, all those included in the table are inpatients and would all have received medical treatment on ward. Intensive care is both the Intensive Care Unit and High Dependency Unit and counting any multiple ward episodes for the same patient spell as 1 admission and aggregating together the length of stay.

^{*}Please note that clinical coding runs until July 2023 only, so no records will be returned beyond that date.

In relation to Q2, the information requested is not centrally held as clinical coding is not broken down to that level of detail and an extensive trawl of records would be required to try to locate, gather and verify the information requested.

This would exceed the 'Appropriate Limit' as defined by the Freedom of Information Act 2000. This represents the cost of one or more persons spending 18 hours in determining whether we hold the information, locating, retrieving and extracting this information. The Trust therefore exempts the release of this information under Section 12 (1).

12 (1) Section 1 (1) does not oblige a public authority to comply with a request for information if the authority estimates that the cost of complying with the request would exceed the appropriate limit.

In accordance with the Freedom of Information Act 2000, this letter acts as a Refusal Notice for question 2.
